
supplies during a massive blackout while their dad is out of town, John and Stew must walk 96 miles in the stark desert sun to get help.

When Norris, a Black French Canadian, starts his junior year at an Austin, Texas, high school, he views his fellow students as clichés from "a bad 90s teen movie."




## Playing Through the Turnaround by




## Eragon by Christopher Paolini



and a secret that will seal their fate. One by one they fall prey. Who has choreographed this dastardly scheme? And who will be left to tell the tale?




## Classics

- Start each list on a separate sheet of paper. One list may extend over multiple pages.

- 6. At the end of your work, add this statement: All of these answers came from my head. I did not use the internet, and I only got a few ideas from my parents or other people. Then sign it.
